Punakea's two-hour tours. which offer a lively look at Hawaii's iconic coconut.

Participants can stroll around the upcountry expanse while admiring its 250 coconut trees - some of which are as tall as 100

feet. Visitors taste-test water from just-opened coconuts in various stages of maturity. and they munch on coconut meat of differing ripeness.

The experience culminates in an outdoor exhibition kitchen, where guests get involved in making - and slurping - their own coconut milk. Everyone receives a souvenir bottle of the rich. creamy results.

*Once you put coconut milk in your coffee or cereal. it's game over," McPhee said. "You'll never go back to regular milk."

McPhee makes learning fun as he talks about the many uses of the coconut. from its oil and fiber to its health benefits. He tailors conversations to the interests of each group, and he engages youngsters, asking them to describe what they are tasting and seeing. Since tours are limited to 10 people, multigenerational groups can take over the entire booking.

Guests can also browse the farm's new gift shop and pick up coconut-centric keepsakes, such as T-shirts, hats and cooking tools.

McPhee encourages families to bring a picnic lunch, which they can enjoy after the tour on the oceanview bluff. Plans call for the addition of a cafe selling fresh tastes from the farm.

"Personally, I have never met a coconut I didn't love." McPhee said. "I hope visitors feel the same way by the end of the tour." (www.punakea palms.com)

MAJOR MILESTONES

HIS JULY MARKS the 50th anniversary of Apollo 11's seminal moon landing in 1969. To celebrate the momentous event, Space Center Houston is hosting nine days of special activities for kids — and adults — to discover NASA's history. The celebration will

launch July 16, the same day Apollo 11 lifted off, and culminate in full-day festivities July 20, the anniversary of the moon landing itself. The celebration will conclude July 24, the date Apollo 11 returned to Earth 50 years ago.

The all-day celebration on July 20 will comprise book signings, an evening concert, late-night tours to Rocket Park and more. Panel presentations throughout the day will introduce visitors to topics such as lunar module operations and lunar science experiments.

VIP packages will include additional experiences, such as a tour of Apollo Mission

Control Center — where the Apollo 11 mission was operated and a special presentation by a range of Apollo-era experts.

Here are some of the other recurring events presented by Space Center Houston.

Tram Tours: Every day from July 16-24, the center's NASA tram tour will take visitors to the Apollo Mission Control Center, which will be restored to its 1960s look.

Pop-Up Science Labs: These Apollo 11-themed labs will let kids interact with science and engineering firsthand. Workshops will help them understand what went into making the first moon walk happen.

Lunch With Apollo Flight
Controllers: On July 16 and 24,
participants will enjoy a lunch and
discussion with an Apollo-era flight
controller and get the chance to ask
about experiences and memories
from the mission. On July 18, there
is a similar lunch with the descendants of Apollo-era astronauts and
